Message from Nancy Kokenge, Board Chair



There's lots to celebrate about YNHS!

This past year, we began converting the old Motel 6 in downtown Yakima on Staff Sgt. Pendleton Way to Vecino ("Neighbor" in Spanish) Apartments. Twenty of the units are for families and 19 for young adults ages 18-24. Moveins have started while construction on a new community center begins later this summer. Thank you to the Washington State Department of Commerce for supporting this necessary housing project.

And this spring, we officially broke ground on a project that's brought lots of people and nonprofit institutions together in a collaboration that is certainly a national model for how to get primary health care to underserved communities. Our dental education facility, now under construction on our Terrace Heights campus next door to Terrace Heights Adult & Senior Care, will begin accepting students from Pacific Northwest University of Health Sciences School of Dental Medicine next year.

The 15,220 square foot dental clinic will house 22 dental operatories, classrooms, and offices. By 2029, 36 dentists will graduate each year, many of whom will practice in rural and underserved areas.

We extend a special thanks to Representatives Chris Corry, Jeremie Dufault, and Senator Curtis King for their crucial support of this project, along with Delta Dental of Washington and the Yakima County Development Association.

Lastly, we were all reinvigorated by a visit last November from Dr. Jim O'Connell, the Harvard physician who has been practicing street medicine in the Boston area for some 40 years. The author of "Rough Sleepers," with Tracy Kidder, visited with our outreach team after holding a symposium for medical students at PNWU. Thank you, Dr. O'Connell, for your generous donation to keep Neighborhood Showers supplied with hygiene items.



Enrollment in Diabetes Program Skyrockets

In collaboration with our partner, Community Health Plan of Washington, we stepped up recruitment for our Diabetes Self-Management Education and Support (DSMES) program.

After a group session, participants join a food demonstration hosted by SNAP Ed Educators featuring recipes low in carbohydrates. Participants sample each recipe and go home with a copy. Those who participate in three or more food demonstrations are presented with either a Crockpot, an air fryer, a pressure cooker, or a cookware set, thanks to our partnership with CHPW.

We are currently training our Community Health Workers in the areas of diabetes and hypertension so they can work one-on-one with participants to meet their self-management goals.

Thank you, Dr. O'Connell

Dr. Jim O'Connell, a nationally recognized expert on street medicine, visited YNHS last November to learn about our integrated approach to health care for the homeless. He left impressed with the scope of our outreach:

"I cannot find the words to express how deeply moved and inspired I was to spend time with Rhonda Hauff and the committed and compassionate staff of the Yakima Neighborhood Health Services. In a beautiful and loving environment, an array of desperately needed health and social services are offered unconditionally and without judgment, from innovative respite and recuperative care for those who are too ill or injured to withstand the harshness of life on the streets, in shelters, or in encampments, to housing and supportive services, and even to the prevention of homelessness through early intervention with landlords. The work and spirit of Yakima Neighborhood Health Services is beyond special and

Vecino Apartments

In 2023, YNHS purchased and converted a former Motel 6 into 39 units of new permanent supportive housing (PSH), combining low-barrier affordable housing, health care, and supportive services for those experiencing homelessness. Named the Vecino Apartments, 19 units are set aside for young adults & 20 units are for housing homeless families with disabilities. Two of the units are handicapped accessible. A roof solar system has also been installed, supported by a Clean Energy Community Grant from the Department of Commerce.

Patient Success Stories

The Everyday Work of YNHS Case Managers

- Living in a shelter and struggling with unhealthy coping mechanisms, a patient turned to a YNHS Supported Employment Specialist for help. YNHS helped them apply for benefits, get identification documents, and schedule appointments for medical and behavioral health services. YNHS case managers assisted with job applications, and after a short time, he was offered a job at Zirkle Fruit, where he's gone on to gain additional training and certification for his work. With his job and a move to sober housing, he's still with Zirkle and appreciative of the support he received from YNHS.
- A client who was struggling with physical and mental health issues that impacted their ability to get employment reached out to us. YNHS worked diligently with this individual to help them get their flagger certification. Fairly quickly, they got a job working full-time with a private company and have seen their physical and mental health improve.
- With constant encouragement from YNHS, a patient who had a history of substance abuse and difficulty getting hired despite successful interviews found employment at a restaurant. We're excited that their hard work paid off!
- A number of our clients work diligently on getting hired while working through mental health challenges. YNHS is a partner throughout the process and a cheerleader to help you celebrate your wins as you find work and develop the confidence and motivation to go after goals, big and small.
- Through challenging times, YNHS is here to help you find your way. One client from Granger, fleeing domestic violence with her children, worked with us to apply for financial aid and qualify for a 2-bedroom apartment. YNHS's Apartment in a Box program helped provide essential supplies to get her household started. With the security of stable housing, she and her family were able to access consistent mental and physical health services.

Message from CEO, Rhonda Hauff

At Yakima Neighborhood Health Services, we remain unwavering in our commitment to our mission: to improve the quality of life in our communities by providing accessible and integrated health and social services, ending homelessness, and offering unique learning opportunities for students of health professions. In a world that often feels uncertain, one thing is clear–everyone deserves access to affordable, quality health care and a safe, stable place to live. These are not luxuries; they are the foundation of a meaningful life and the starting point for achieving the American Dream.

Last year, we provided care and support to nearly 30,000 individuals, delivering over 158,000 visits that met a broad range of needs–from medical care and behavioral health services to housing support, hygiene access, and youth engagement. These numbers reflect not only the scope of our work but the resilience of the people we serve.

We are not alone in this mission. We are joined by community partners, funders, advocates, and neighbors who share our vision for a healthier future.

It is this shared commitment that keeps us going, knowing that change is possible when we work together, and that every person we help move forward brings our community one step closer to being whole. Thank you for standing with us.
